

Symposium 2: Evolving Ethical Issues in Paediatric Research – A perspective from Singapore

Abstract

Paediatric research has evolved significantly over decades, early research focus on improving child health; reducing infections though vaccinations, reducing and preventing disease morbidity and combating malnutrition, improving survival in preterm infants, still holds importance and relevance

We now have other end of spectrum of malnutrition i.e. obesity and other chronic disease e.g. asthma and diabetes that threatens not only to child health but with long term health implications as adults, hence the focus has shifted towards understanding long-term health consequences and prevention strategies.

Early screening and intervention in neurobehavioral and neurodevelopment disorders involving the family and community, is important to ensure the child drives maximum benefits

Genomic research with personalised medicine offers promising strategies in management of childhood oncology and rare genetic disease.

Despite regulation changes to encourage development of new paediatric drugs, ethical concerns, smaller numbers in recruitment, industry motivations in funding of paediatric-specific drug development and designing age-appropriate clinical trials are still hurdles that has led to limited options for paediatric therapies.
