

Symposium 1: Addressing the Ethical Issues in Adolescent Addictions

Abstract

Adolescent addictions present unique ethical challenges that require careful consideration, especially in Singapore, where the law enforces a zero-tolerance approach to illegal addictive substances. Confidentiality and privacy must be balanced with the need to involve parents. while informed consent necessitates that adolescents fully understand their treatment options and the role of parental consent. Respecting adolescent autonomv while ensuring their well-being poses a significant ethical dilemma. Addressing the stigma associated with addiction and avoiding harmful labeling is crucial to support recovery. Equitable irrespective access to treatment, of socioeconomic status, must be ensured. Treating co-occurring mental health disorders alongside addictiona (dual diagnosis) requires coordinated care and ethical sensitivity. Harm reduction strategies, though sometimes controversial, need to be weighed against the goal of achieving abstinence, especially within Singapore's strict legal framework. Involving adolescents in research on addiction must adhere to strict ethical standards to protect this vulnerable population. Finally, cultural sensitivity is paramount, necessitating tailored treatment approaches that respect diverse attitudes towards addiction. This talk will explore these ethical issues, emphasizing the ethical considerations importance of in enhancing treatment outcomes and fostering ongoing dialogue and education in adolescent addiction treatment.
