

Plenary 2: Advancing Paediatric Research Ethics in Asia: Imperatives, Challenges, and Strategies for Achieving SDGs

Abstract

It will highlight the necessity of culturally sensitive research protocols and the importance of ethical standards in fostering inclusivity. In conclusion, comprehensive strategies are proposed at local, national, and global levels, including supporting dynamic research procedures, enhancing the expertise of ethics committees, and fostering collaborations to share resources and knowledge. By implementing these strategies, paediatric research can overcome its inherent challenges, ultimately contributing to the successful achievement of SDGs in Asia.
