

Symposium 3: Ethical Complexities in Domiciliary Palliative Care - Malaysian Perspective

Abstract

Paediatric Palliative Care promotes active interventions that ensure a child with serious illness lives well to their potential for however long they have. The focus of care is on promoting quality of life and to mitigate suffering. However a child and their family's needs and the location of care may vary throughout the illness journey. Hospital-based palliative care may not be appropriate for families all the time and the availability of domiciliary palliative care becomes a vital component for quality palliative care. However are several ethical challenges in facilitating equitable quality care for children and their families at home and some of these will be discussed.
