## Teaching Undergraduates Acute Care, Professionalism and End of Life Communication A Multidisciplinary, IPE Approach

## Synopsis:

Our Medical graduates after leaving medical school are required to master taking care of real patients and dealing with acute care situations, communicating with families and other nuances of patient care in the acute setting in the wards, A and E and ICU without learning the basic aspects of such care. From personal experience I remember this leap from Medical school to Internship terrifying with many pitfalls and learning on the job after many stumbles. In fact the breaking point in ones trainee years often comes whilst rotating in the ICU!! We know that Acute care training is lacking in UG student life and that multi disciplinary care shown to improve outcomes. We wished to introduce the participants to concepts of bridging the gap of communication amongst different professions and teams in the ICU. There are practical aspects of ICU ethics, communication, empathy and team building which are touched upon in this course in a real life anecdotal form. As feedback it was seen that through this exercise new bonds were formed, and new respect was taught for each other's professions.
