A Mental Rehearsal Strategy to Improve Clinical Performance and Reduce Stress



Mental rehearsal involves deliberate practice of a skill or a task in the mind. It has been effectively used by musicians and athletes to improve their skills. In much recent years, physicians and nurses have used this technique to enhance their clinical skills performance, and it has also been shown as an effective component of stress management training for surgeons. To prepare junior nurses in dealing with stressful events in the actual clinical environment, such as patient deterioration, a mental rehearsal strategy was developed and implemented in a Year 3 nursing simulation programme.

Stress and performance were assessed and a focus group interview was done to evaluate the effectiveness of the developed strategy. Findings suggest that the mental rehearsal strategy for deteriorating patient management improved students' clinical performance. It, however, had no significant effect on stress. Feedback from focus group interviews were positive.
