Measuring Patient Satisfaction Outcomes of a Longitudinal Student-Initiated Homecare Program by Healthcare Students on Frequently Re-Admitted Elderly Patients



The aim is to measure the patient satisfaction outcomes of a longitudinal student-initiated home care programme, called TriGenerational Home Care (TriGen). TriGen targets frequently re-admitted elderly patients. Healthcare students from different faculties, together with secondary school students, visit the elderly patients in their homes on a fortnightly basis over 6 months, called one cycle. Analysis was done comparing pre and post cycle Hospital Admission Rates and Emergency Department visit rates. In addition, analysis of the pre and post Programme Evaluation Questionnaire (PEQ) and Patient Feedback Survey was done. Results seem to suggest TriGen has made a positive impact on the patients.

Ms Simran is a M2 student from NUS Medicine and a committee member of TriGenerational Home Care project, under the research subcommittee. They have been working with the GERI team at KTPH. In addition to elderly patients, they also administer surveys to university and secondary school students to assess if their inter-healthcare collaboration and perceptions of ageism have improved.

Worldwide Prevalence of Burnout in Medical and Surgical Residents: A Meta-analysis

There is increasing concern about burnout experienced by medical and surgical residents or trainees worldwide. Uncertainty exists about the prevalence of burnout among residents worldwide. Associations between burnout and gender, age, specialty, geographical location of training are unclear. In this meta-analysis, we aimed to quantitatively summarise the global prevalence rates of burnout among residents, by specialty, and its contributing factors.

A/Prof Ho is an active medical educator and researcher. He has published ~200 international papers with >1,000 annual citations in the most recent year. He is the author or co-author of 6 books published by Hodder Arnold (UK) and Taylor and Francis (US), including a well-known graduate text, Revision Notes in Psychiatry (3rd edition).
