Exploring Year 2 Nursing Students' Perceptions of Critical Thinking and Clinical Reasoning: A Descriptive Qualitative Study

Ms Wong Su Hui Valynn is a 4th year (Honour's Program) nursing student at Alice Lee Centre for Nursing Studies. Her research interest is development of critical thinking and clinical reasoning. Ms Valynn has conducted a research study and established a foundation in qualitative research on this topic, such as literature reviews and qualitative methodologies. Apart from these research skills, Ms Valynn has experienced personal growth throughout the project.

Critical thinking and clinical reasoning are core competencies developed throughout the nursing education

and nursing practice. The study aimed to explore year 2 nursing students' perceptions towards critical thinking and clinical reasoning development, and the barriers faced in developing these skills. The qualitative method was used to gain deep insights into the students' experiences, perceptions and the factors that play a role in shaping their development of critical thinking and clinical reasoning skills. The results of the study provide important information to help nursing institutions tailor their curriculum to better support nursing students in developing their critical thinking and clinical reasoning to become competent nurses.

Delivering Values-based Education through Experiential Learning in a Residency Outdoor Orientation Camp: A Mixed-Method Study



Post-graduate medical residency programs are traditionally well equipped to inculcate clinical capabilities. delivered through outcomes-based education. Values-based education is integral in nurturing a wellrounded resident. A promising approach is that of experiential learning, hinging on immersive participation and reflection, followed by conceptualization and experimentation. The biannual National University Health System (NUHS) 3-day-2-night residency outdoor orientation camp is designed with "Outward Bound Singapore". It aims to inculcate NUHS institutional TRICE values (Teamwork, Respect, Integrity, Compassion, Excellence). This mixed-methods study collates responses through Likert scales and residents' reflective journalling.
