ZOOM-ing in on Online Teaching in the COVID-19 Era: A Near-Peer Led On-Call Preparatory Workshop for a Large Cohort of Incoming House Officers (HOs)

Tele-clinical Teaching (TCT) from Primary Care: A Survey of Tutors and Students of Their Experience of Live-Streamed Clinical Teaching from the Frontline
