Biomedical Students' Course Preference and Links with Quality of Life and Psychological Distress



This presentation draws on work conducted by myself, Vanamali Joseph, Roger Booth, Christian Krägeloh, and Craig Webster. In this presentation, I explore the psycho-social experiences of first year premedical and health science students, in a high stakes' year of study, at the University of Auckland, New Zealand. The presentation delves into the debate regarding placing students with mixed career intentions in one course and the significance this may have on interprofessional and large student group teaching. I will also consider the implications for wellbeing, pedagogy, equity, and expenditure.
