# NUS students organise upscaled free health screening for HDB residents

Singapore, 8 October 2017 — Elderly residents of Kampong Glam will be assessed for frailty and mental health issues as well as chronic illnesses at free health screenings in October.

Organised by NUS Medicine students and involving the participation of their Nursing and Social Work counterparts, the Neighbourhood Health Service (NHS) is an annual community health screening that aims to identify residents in need. It focuses on the elderly and residents from lower income families living in rental blocks and reconnects them to the healthcare system. This is achieved through free centralised and door-to-door health screenings, house-visits and follow-up phone calls.

Since its inception a decade ago, the NHS has touched the lives of more than 4,000 rental block residents in eight rental districts in Singapore. From offering just three screening modalities in its inaugural screening, the NHS has expanded its scope to more than 20 services, providing residents with a robust assessment of their health.

This year's exercise began on the weekend of 9 September, with more than 400 rental block residents screened by over 350 volunteer doctors and healthcare students. The event was witnessed by Associate Professor Fatimah Lateef, Member of Parliament, Marine Parade GRC, and Mr Amrin Amin, Parliamentary Secretary, Ministry of Home Affairs & Ministry of Health.

The second health screening for 2017 will be conducted on 7 and 8 October, and marks the first time that NHS is screening Kampong Glam residents. Dr Amy Khor, Senior Minister of State (SMS), Ministry of Health, and Ms Denise Phua, Mayor, Central Singapore CDC will grace the event on Sunday, 8 October 2017.

"The Neighbourhood Health Service exemplifies an activity that is student-led, and helps to nurture competent, compassionate, creative, community-responsive and innovative doctors and

nurses of tomorrow," said Associate Professor Lau Tang Ching, Vice-Dean for Education at NUS Medicine. "The services provided enable the students to apply the skills they have learnt with competence to help elderly residents in maintaining or improving their health."

# Several defining features of the NHS:

- Outreach to rental block residents, who are often unable to take good care of their own health, and unable to overcome barriers that hinder access to healthcare. This leaves them disconnected from the healthcare system;
- Door-to-door health screening in addition to centralised screening, for residents who face difficulties leaving their homes (due to poor mobility, psychological issues etc.);
- A longitudinal house-visit and phone-call follow-up programme anchored to behavioural change frameworks, to actively encourage residents to seek treatment for their chronic conditions;
- Evaluation of the socio-economic situation of residents, referring those in need to social organisations, since health is an aspect of life compounded by medical and social factors;
- Adoption of a Five-Year Plan Framework for each constituency served. This provides a bedrock for sustainability and ensures that the areas in most need are being served.

#### New features of NHS 2017:

- Introduction of Fall Risk and Mental Health Assessments, with referrals to healthcare institutions for subsidised rehabilitative treatment and case management services;
- Partial to full subsidy of spectacles for residents with visual impairment;
- Referrals for fully-subsidised colonoscopy;
- Fully-subsidised first consultation for residents at CHAS GP Clinics in Eunos Crescent and Kampong Glam;
- Introduction of gamification into health education to better engage residents.

The service has also been continuing its follow-up with residents in constituencies screened in previous years, including Bukit Merah, Marine Terrace (Breeze and Haven Zone) and Taman Jurong (Zone B and E), and intends to ensure that all residents under NHS' purview are integrated into the healthcare system.
