Meeting of minds as Nobel Prize laureates and youth discuss global well-being in Singapore

Singapore, 29 June 2022— Rising global temperatures, global pandemics, war in Europe, intensifying geopolitical tensions in Asia and the Middle East, acute food shortages, systemic poverty, resource scarcity and gender inequality.

These are the endemic, globe-spanning issues that 60 students (in the ages from 15 to 35 years old) from Singapore, along with counterparts from the Asia-Pacific region, will be invited to think deeply about during discussions with Nobel Prize laureates and international experts. These conversations will take place during July and August 2022.

The discussions will culminate in a one-day gathering at the **Nobel Prize Dialogue**, **held in Singapore on 13 September 2022**, where youth and Nobel Prize laureates as well as local and international thought leaders, who come from disciplines that range from economics to climate science gather to share, review and crystalise ideas and suggestions that could help deal with the most critical problems facing the world today.

Organised by the Nobel Prize Outreach and Yong Loo Lin School of Medicine, National University of Singapore (NUS Medicine), in partnership with the Asian Medical Students' Association (AMSA) Singapore, the discussions and one-day plenary that make up the Nobel Prize Dialogue Singapore will be held under the theme, 'The Future We Want Together'. While the Nobel Prize Outreach has held similar events in the Asia-Pacific region, this is the first Nobel Prize Dialogue that will be held in Southeast Asia.

Mr Teo Chee Hean, Singapore's Senior Minister and Coordinating Minister for National Security will grace the opening ceremony as the Guest-of-Honour. The Dialogue will take on a hybrid format, combining a "live" in-person event of about 500 participants with a virtual component where the public may register to view the Dialogue online.

Seeking answers

The <u>Singapore edition of the Nobel Prize Dialogue</u> seeks to deepen discussions between the research community and the rest of society on topics of global concern. The meeting brings together Nobel Prize laureates, local and international experts, as well as students, providing a rare opportunity to bridge the gap between generations, with students and youth from all over Asia in inter-generational conversations with global thought leaders to explore how mistakes of the past can be avoided and how best to promote humanity's well-being. To date, the following Nobel Prize laureates have confirmed their participation: **Steven Chu, physics laureate 1997; Angus Deaton, economic sciences laureate 2015; Esther Duflo,**

economic sciences laureate 2019; Serge Haroche, physics laureate 2012; May-Britt Moser, medicine laureate 2014; Paul Romer, economic sciences laureate 2018; George Smoot, physics laureate 2006; and Kailash Satyarthi, peace laureate 2014.

The Dialogue will consider six broad areas, in the context of ongoing global crises: **Education**, **Climate Change**, **Health**, **Happiness as well as Economic and Digital Wellbeing**. These are areas that the youth of today are concerned about, and this unique event will provide opportunities for them to engage with some of the world's foremost thinkers. The catalogue of potential concerns is worryingly long, and includes educational disruption, reduced career opportunities, threat of unemployment and poverty, increasing anxiety, stress and mental health issues, increasing economic and social inequities, digital disruptions and concerns, impact of social media and the rise in misinformation, and limited avenues for artistic expression. In addition, the programme will include a special session to explore conflict prevention, management and resolution as well as the exploration and colonisation of space.

Today's youth, tomorrow's leaders

"Students from all over the Asia-Pacific region will play a leading role in the Dialogue as they will be engaged in discussions with the Nobel Prize laureates prior to the event. Our experience is that these kinds of inter-generational discussions are of great importance for the students, the laureates and the broader society," said Laura Sprechmann, Chief Executive Officer, Nobel Prize Outreach.

Professor Chong Yap Seng, Dean, NUS Medicine, said, "Our youth is our future. How that future unfolds will to a very large extent be determined by the actions that we take today, to face the myriad crises and challenges that confront humankind. Climate change is an existential threat, as is disease. Poverty and conflict are phenomenon that result from the pursuit of narrow, exclusivist interests that are further entrenched through the advent of technology. Young people must be involved in shaping the decisions and actions that are taken to confront and surmount these threats; their voices and views must be heard and respected and their involvement is paramount. That is the ultimate purpose of the Nobel Prize Dialogue Singapore, which we are organising together with Nobel Prize Outreach."

Charles Tiu, President, AMSA Singapore, added, "AMSA Singapore is honoured to play a key role in the Nobel Prize Dialogue Singapore. We thank our partners, NUS Medicine and Nobel Prize Outreach, for empowering youth with a platform to share our thoughts, hopes and dreams through a series of multidisciplinary discussions. As a student-run organisation, AMSA Singapore believes in the importance of youths in decision-making and change. We hope that this event will not only give participants the opportunity to discuss their ideas and aspirations with thought leaders, but also—and more importantly—to start a precedent where young people are more involved in such conversations involving our future."
