Cancer prevention initiatives, comprehensive health education at forefront of Public Health Service 2022

Singapore, 20 August 2022 — Cancer is the leading cause of death in Singapore, and 1 in 4 Singaporeans will develop it in their lifetime. This stresses the paramount importance of early cancer detection and prevention—which is at the forefront of this year's Public Health Service (PHS), held on 20 and 21 August 2022, at the Canopy @ J-Link.

A preventive health project organised by the NUS Medical Society, the student body of the NUS Yong Loo Lin School of Medicine (NUS Medicine), the PHS is an annual initiative that began since 2004, involving Singapore's three public healthcare clusters: the National University Health System, the National Healthcare Group and SingHealth. The upcoming comprehensive health screening event would be engaging about 600 volunteers across both days of the event, including medical, nursing and dental students, doctors as well as allied health professionals such as physiotherapists, occupational therapists and audiologists, supported by PHS alumni.

The PHS motto, "Promoting Health, Spreading Awareness", effectively summarises what PHS aims to accomplish as a health service. Firstly, it promotes the health of our local community through a population-based approach, by employing primary and secondary prevention strategies that reinforce positive health behaviour in the public. This is reinforced by spreading awareness of the need and the means to look after one's own health through our health education programmes.

As the first in-person event since a two-year hiatus due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the NUS Medical Society aims to not only kick start PHS's engines of health screening and disease detection, but also expand its focus on more diseases—particularly the detection and education of various types of cancer.

Attended by Guest-of-Honour Ms Grace Fu, Minister for Sustainability and the Environment and Member of Parliament for Yuhua, the 15th edition of the free annual health screening event aims to reach 1,000 residents over the weekend. Open to all Singaporeans and Permanent Residents 40 years-old and above, the health screening aims to re-integrate them into the health system, if necessary.

"The Public Health Service complements new Singapore's Healthier SG initiative well. This inter-disciplinary approach to health screening has been fostering inter-professional collaborative practice and continues to encourage healthcare students to understand and appreciate the intricacies of looking after patients on ground. Indeed, the goals of PHS is closely aligned with NUS Medicine's vision: "Inspiring Health for All", said Associate Professor Lau Tang Ching, Vice-Dean of Education, NUS Yong Loo Lin School of Medicine.

Importance of early cancer detection

The health screening would include risk assessment and screening for various cancers and chronic diseases, such as metabolic syndrome, and common geriatrics conditions. PHS 2022 would also educate residents on the importance of disease prevention, through 13 newly updated modalities, such as the Women's Cancer Education and Faecal immunochemical Test (FIT), as well as partnerships with various organisations.

Mr. Yeo Sheng Yep, Brian, Co-Project Director of PHS 2022 and third-year student at NUS Medicine, said, "Cancer is one of Singapore's leading causes of death. A cancer diagnosis could leave a detrimental impact on both patients and their families. Substantial medical literature to date has shown that detecting some cancers early can significantly increase the probability of survival and remission. Hence, PHS strives to provide a comprehensive health screening for our community, and deepen our emphasis on the prevention and early detection of cancers."

Streamlining its focus on a holistic programme of prevention and education, the PHS team would be setting up a comprehensive exhibition beside their health screening, with close to 20 partner organisations, including National Cancer Centre Singapore (NCCS), National University Cancer Institute, Singapore (NCIS) and National Kidney Foundation (NKF), to educate the public about a variety of common conditions seen in Singapore. The collaborative efforts between PHS and its partner organisations reflect a common goal in promoting health in the community.

Increasing health literacy among population

Tying in the objective of increasing health literacy among the population, the PHS 2022 team has also developed the Public Health Catalogue (PHC) as an initiative to help educate the general public.

The catalogue includes health tips and advice for common conditions such as high cholesterol and metabolic syndrome. It also seeks to address common health-related misconceptions, and offers information about government subsidies, to aid readers in taking charge of their own health.

Ms Surabhi Riya Vig, Co-Project Director of PHS 2022 and third-year student at NUS Medicine, said, "We are grateful for the positive uptake and feedback from the residents in Jurong East who received our PHC booklets. The PHC serves as a comprehensive and

convenient guide to encourage residents to take responsibility for their own health. We hope our recipients would be incentivised to adopt healthy living practices!"
